The City of Irving and Irving Economic Development Partnership (IEDP), managed by the Greater Irving-Las Colinas Chamber of Commerce and its partners, are proud of the city’s continued economic achievements during the global challenges of Fiscal Year 2021. The City of Irving invests in economic development to attract and retain national and global corporations and to support small businesses to ensure a healthy, growing city. We are committed to planned, sustainable economic growth that creates well-paying jobs, prosperity, stability, attractive amenities, world-class healthcare, educational opportunities, and a safe, beautiful community to live in and enjoy.

Our vision and success have earned Irving-Las Colinas the reputation as the *Headquarters of Headquarters* in Texas, with eight Fortune 500 and four Fortune 1000 global headquarters here. We have more large public/private companies

than any city in North Texas other than Dallas, and we are one of the leading cities in Texas for foreign business investment, with more than 150 foreign-owned companies operating in our business hub.

Why do global companies put down roots here? Corporate executives, site selectors, real estate brokers, and others tell us it’s our convenient central location in North Texas, only minutes from DFW International Airport and Dallas Love Field; a diverse population; access to a skilled workforce of three million people within a 30-minute commute; lifestyle amenities that include unsurpassed outdoor recreational activities such as hike/ bike trails, lakes, parks, golf courses and recreation centers; world-class entertainment venues; and exceptional dining experiences. Corporations also appreciate our supportive public policies and Las Colinas as a master-planned, model Transit Oriented Development

(TOD) that gives their employees a highly desirable live, work, walk, play, and visit environment.

As we close Fiscal Year 2021, we are pleased to report a successful year of corporate recruitment, retention and expansion that has produced thousands of jobs and over \$300 million in capital investment. Despite the slowdown caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, 114 prospective projects remain in our economic development pipeline, worth more than \$34 billion in capital investment, 95,000 new jobs, and 30 million square feet of commercial space.

As the country exits this recovery period, we expect our economy to rebound quickly, and we will accelerate our efforts to amplify the Irving-Las Colinas story worldwide. 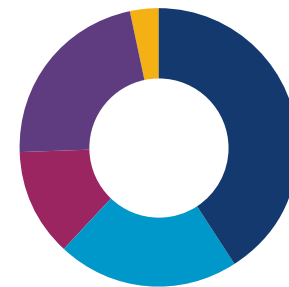
What is the Irving Economic Development Partnership (IEDP)?

In 2002, the City of Irving contracted a fee-for-services agreement with the Greater Irving-Las Colinas Chamber to be a one-stop shop for relocation and retention/expansion prospects by providing data, site visits, information on state and local incentive opportunities, zoning and permitting assistance, and marketing activity that amplifies the Irving-Las Colinas story worldwide.

The IEDP partners are the City of Irving, Las Colinas Association, Irving Convention and Visitors Bureau, and the Greater Irving-Las Colinas Chamber of Commerce Economic Development Advisory Council, comprised of more than 100 local business executives committed to financially supporting economic development privately in Irving-Las Colinas. Other non-affiliated partners include the DFW Marketing Team, Texas Economic Development Corporation, and Team Texas.

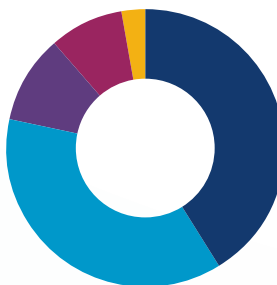

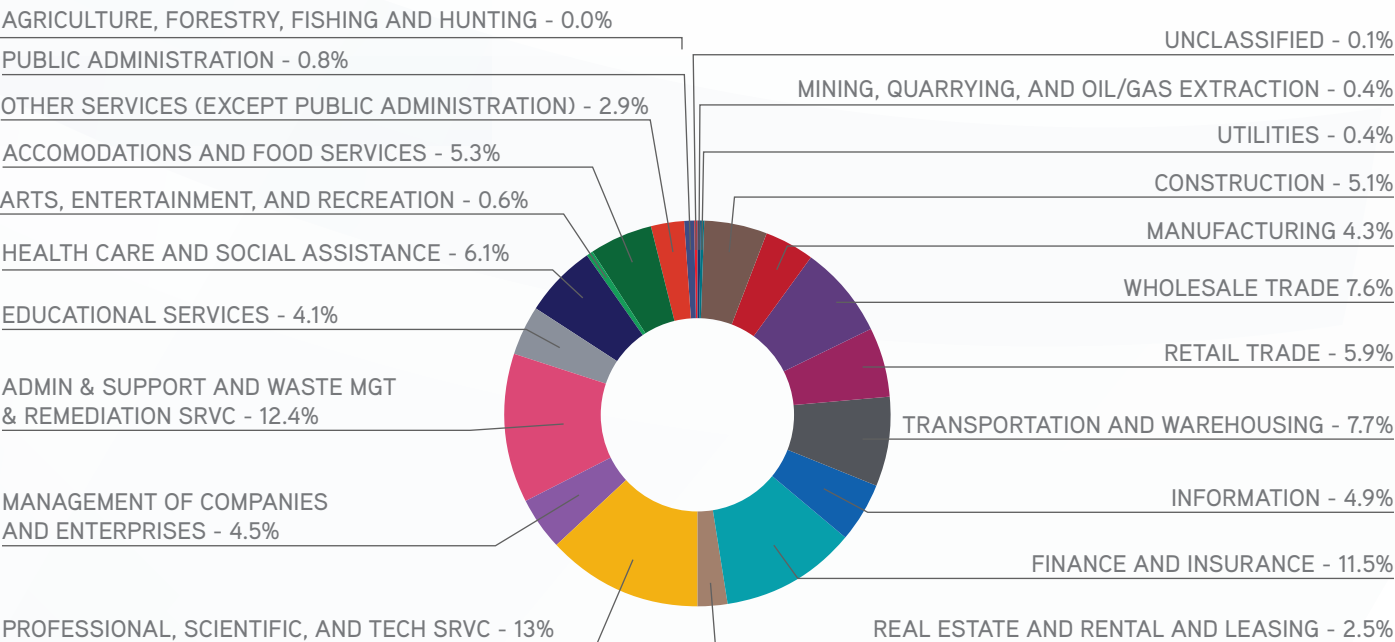

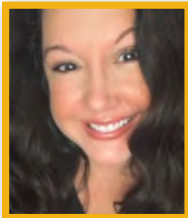

International Affairs/Sister Cities: Bringing the World to Irving-Las Colinas

Despite the constraints on international travel that prohibited in-person outbound trade missions this year, Irving's International Affairs and Sister Cities (IASC) programs were exceptionally productive, with events that included: 6 cultural events, 7 trade conferences/seminars, 24 outreach contacts with our 6 Sister Cities contacts, 5 virtual and in-person international visits, 6 Trade Center events, and 13 retention business visits. Here are the highlights:

Major Cultural Events: In June, IASC helped organize and facilitate an Olympic Day celebration in Irving-Las Colinas. Officially sanctioned by the U.S. Olympic & Paralympic Committee and International Olympic Committee, IASC worked with 19 organizations overseeing 18 educational, arts and culture, and sporting events. IASC also participated in the Japan-America

Society "Friendship Night" in Houston with a special cultural event hosted by the Honorable Hideo Fukushima, Consul General of Japan.

Trade Conferences: IASC participated in a week-long Korean-American Chamber International Trade & Investment Expo. We also hosted a United States-Japan Business Roundtable at the University of Dallas and co-hosted the 7th Sustainability Summit (virtual) with the United States-Mexico Chamber of Commerce in Leon, Mexico, an Irving Sister City.

Historic Trade Mission: In July, IASC hosted an unprecedented trade development luncheon with President Laurentino Cortizo of Panama, a Panamanian delegation, and local business and government leaders that resulted in the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding

What is the International Affairs/Sister Cities program? In a separate fee-for-services contract with the City of Irving, the International Affairs and Sister Cities (IASC) program manages international protocol services for the Mayor of Irving, special events, educational forums, and trade missions to enhance global awareness of Irving-Las Colinas and to help facilitate local import and export trade for local businesses. IASC also is committed to supporting and expanding its relationships with Irving-Las Colinas' more than 150 foreign-based companies.

In total, IASC's public outreach was over 77,000 through in-person and virtual events.

Small Businesses Fuel Our Local Economy

While much attention is paid to our global corporate community, the thousands of small businesses in Irving-Las Colinas, and their services, employees, and customers are the fuel for our local economic engine, growth, and job creation. These companies contribute to the quality of life and convenience of our residents and workforce. Promoting, recruiting, retaining, and supporting their success and growth has always been among our strategic initiatives, but never more so than during the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Personal Contact: For the second year, 60 Chamber, City, and Las Colinas Association staff and volunteers visited 1,000 small businesses in Irving-Las Colinas to thank them for investing in and serving our community, with leave-behind resource kits containing face masks, hand sanitizer, and other swag prepared by local small business AlphaGraphics Las Colinas. The Small Business Blitz was an outreach opportunity to offer support, information, and identify issues that IEDP could be helpful with providing solutions, too. Also, our team personally visited with 102 small businesses in Irving's Heritage

District to discuss Irving Boulevard reconstruction activity.

Best in Irving: We sponsored the popular Best In Irving competition, with 41 small businesses voted winners by their customers and fans and recognized for their excellence in a virtual Signature Program.

Educational & Networking Opportunities: The IEDP supported virtual networking and educational programs such as Coffee Break, the Small Business Services Committee's Business Connection, and our Five-Star Business Mixers. Every new business receiving a sales tax permit received a welcome letter from the IEDP that offered support and local resources for their new business.

SCORE Counseling: SCORE, a U.S. Small Business Administration program, locally sponsored by the IEDP, offers advice, support, and mentoring for start-up businesses. This year, the complementary service helped nearly 400 local entrepreneurs navigate the complexities of federal assistance programs and business challenges.

COVID-19 Support and Recovery Activities for Irving-Las Colinas Small Businesses

Local COVID-19 Update. The IEDP hosted Zoom meetings with DFW Hospital Council CEO Steve Love to provide updated information on COVID-19 healthcare developments and resources available to businesses.

Dallas County Economic Recovery Advisory Committee. IEDP President & CEO Beth Bowman continued to serve on a Dallas County committee to provide feedback from Irving-Las Colinas businesses on COVID-19 business-industry issues.

North Texas Congressional Job Fair. We supported Congresswoman Beth Van Duyne in hosting a job fair with our partners at the City of Irving and the Irving Convention & Visitors Bureau on July 15 at the Irving Convention Center at Las Colinas. The event brought together nearly 300 businesses seeking to fill 10,000 job positions.

Amplifying the Irving-Las Colinas Story

Like most businesses, IEDP adjusted its business practices due to COVID-19 restrictions that limited travel and in-person contact. As a result, marketing and social media became an increasingly important means of delivering the Irving-Las Colinas story to a national and worldwide audience. The *Dallas Business Journal* is a valued digital economic development partner. IEDP is the exclusive economic development sponsor of the DBJ Relocation Center, reaching an audience of about 3 million, and

the DBJ Economic Develop Hub & Domestic Marketing Campaign, with a focus on specific Irving-Las Colinas business stories and why our city is a great place to grow a business.

Business Facilities magazine and *Site Selectors* magazine featured full-page advertisements, advertorials, and one feature profile on why Irving is the “Headquarters of Headquarters in Texas” and should be your new home for your business.


Our print readers, online viewers and podcast listeners reached a total audience of over 12 million. Our social media reach was nearly 50,000 followers, over 100,000 website visits and 1.2 million digital impressions equaling a 20% increase over our FY 2020 results.

Return on Investment (ROI):
Delivering Value and Results
for Irving-Las Colinas

The IEDP is a public/private strategic collaboration of the Greater Irving-Las Colinas Chamber of Commerce, City of Irving, Irving Convention & Visitors Bureau, Las Colinas Association, and private business-industry investors. The Partnership exists to fuel business growth, promote new capital investment, create high-quality jobs, and improve Irving-Las Colinas’ quality of life.

An independent analysis by Impact Data Source in Austin, Texas reports that in FY 2021, an investment of \$2,172,305 produced 32 “wins” and generated an ROI of 104.6%. When combined with the \$319,770 public investment in International Affairs/Sister Cities’ (IASC) funding, the ROI is 91.1%.

Over the last five years (FY2017-FY2021), economic development driven or produced by the IEDP has generated a total economic output of \$2.85 billion for Irving-Las Colinas residents, further demonstrating the value and importance of long-term strategic, sustainable economic growth for Irving-Las Colinas.

IEDP’s long-range strategic plan, accepted by the Irving City Council in 2017, is to make Irving-Las Colinas a premier location for business relocation and expansion and to become America’s leading international business center. The plan targets industries that represent growth, stability, and support our existing business industry, including corporate headquarters, foreign-based corporations, software and information technology, finance and insurance, healthcare and laboratories, and professional services. The following represents the key initiatives and scope of work in that plan:

- Strengthen Irving’s business recruitment efforts through partnerships with existing local businesses and collaborate with our regional and state partners on economic development opportunities.
- Support and leverage Irving-Las Colinas’ hospitality and conference/event assets.
- Provide Irving-Las Colinas’ businesses with valuable support activities such as legislative advocacy, workforce talent development, creating network opportunities and profiling successful local companies.
- Build relationships with key influencers and introduce them to the Irving-Las Colinas story and our outstanding business and lifestyle amenities.
- Employ incentives to enhance Irving-Las Colinas’ competitive position in the relocation marketplace. Direct incentives to corporations that bring a strong ROI to our city.
- Create a dynamic local environment for entrepreneurship, innovation, and research & development activities by providing education, training, and networking opportunities for small businesses and entrepreneurs.
- Promote development of the Heritage Crossing District through marketing and enhancements.
- Facilitate networking, marketing, and social media & communication opportunities that support the economic development plan.
- Facilitate trade missions that attract investment from foreign businesses and support local businesses seeking entry into foreign markets.

The Economic Development Advisory Council is comprised of more than 100 private sector investors representing large, medium and small Irving-Las Colinas businesses, retailers, commercial and residential brokers, and civic leaders who are committed to expanding the city’s business recruitment and retention/ expansion efforts and to promoting the city’s brand awareness in targeted markets and industries worldwide.

What is Beyond Boundaries?
On June 1, 2020, the Chamber Board of Directors approved a five-year private sector fundraising initiative called Beyond Boundaries, with the goal of raising \$1.5 million

to support the City of Irving’s economic development efforts. Beyond Boundaries is managed by the Chamber’s 501(c)(3) Community Development Foundation with a separate Board of Directors.
